





Methodology

- Responses from 121 unique institutions

What kind of institution are you representing?





Does your institution have a pandemic plan or other similar emergency preparedness plans in place?






Please select the response that best characterizes how your institution has responded to the current outbreak







Has your institution noticed increased levels of discriminatory behavior since the outbreak?




What is/are the area(s) of international education most significantly affected at your institution?

What are your institution's plan to mitigate those concerns?






Respondents

- Survey administered from 19 February to 6 March 2020
- Prerequisite to work at an HEI in the EHEA
- 805 individual respondents from 628 unique HEIs in 38 EHEA countries
- Top respondent numbers from FR, DE, IT, NL, ES & UK (just over 53% of total responses)
- 10+ responses from 15 other countries
- Respondents' roles: 35% international office staff
 - 29% head of international office










Effects on <u>outbound</u> student mobility


Effects on <u>inbound</u> student mobility








Countries to which <u>outbound</u> student mobility has been affected

Significance of <u>outbound</u> mobility effects, students and staff

	Effects on student mobility (n=587)	Effects on administrative or academic staff mobility (n=435)
Not so significant	25%	28%
Somewhat significant	57%	53%
Very significant	15%	15%
Not sure	3%	4%
Totals	100%	100%




Significance of <u>inbound</u> mobility effects, students and staff

	Effects on student mobility (n=387)	Effects on administrative or academic staff mobility (n=216)
Not so significant	26%	25%
Somewhat significant	51%	56%
Very significant	21%	17%
Not sure	2%	2%
Totals	100%	100%

- → 17 of the top 20 institutions sending study abroad students






International Students from China

37% of institutions reported that some students from were unable to come or return to their U.S. campus because of coronavirus-related travel restrictions


0.4% of the total Chinese student population at responding institutions were not able to travel to the United States





U.S. Study Abroad to China

48% of respondents reported that their institution had students scheduled to go on study abroad programs in China in the spring 2020 semester.






Institutional Impacts on Outreach and Recruitment

76% of institutions reported that outreach or recruiting events in China had been affected by the coronavirus outbreak.
